#### Eastern Walkway Location Miramar, Wellington, New Zealand

Overview One of the WCC Explore Wellington walkways across the Eastern Peninsula

Grade Easy ...Access Foot

The Eastern walkway extends between Seatoun and Tarakena Bay. The route shown begins at Tarakena Bay (car park for Ataturk memorial), heads north along the well signposted Eastern Walkway route across the hills to Pass of Branda, then down into Seatoun and back along the coast around Point Dorset and then follows the shoreline around Breaker Bay, Eve Bay, Flax Bay, Reef Bay, Palmer Bay, past the Wahine Memorial Park and back to the carpark at Ataturk memorial. The walk is about 4 km in each direction, allow 2.5 to 3 hours if walking. Cycling is not allowed across the Eastern walkway, but you can cycle along the coast road.

The route includes several entry exit points - Bury Grove, Sidlaw Street, Signallers Grove and there are two entrances on Beacon Hill Road.

The walkway is well maintained with wooden steps in many places, but some spots can get muddy after heavy rain.

#### **CYCLEWAYS – MIRAMAR AVE UP GRADE:**

As you will all now be aware the WCC, Miramar BID and the Community have been working with Consultants regarding cycleways and the upgrade of Miramar Ave.

Stage 1 is the road between Cobham Drive and the roundabout at the bottom of Mapuia Road with stage 2 out to the public for consultation.

People in your community have been working with us on ways to make it easier and safer to walk and bike around Miramar, between the eastern suburbs and into the central city.

There are three projects in Miramar where you can have your say.

WCC are running a four-week consultation proposing changes to Miramar Avenue from the Shelly Bay Road intersection to Tauhinu Road intersection, at the same time, WCC are seeking feedback for two weeks on a number of streets in Miramar. Miramar Connections has a range of proposed options that vary street by street —Have your say on Miramar Town Centre between Tauhinu Road and Park Road (Miramar Avenue phase 2).

## PREDITOR FREE MIRAMAR HAS BEEN LAUNCHED

If you're a rat in Miramar, your days are numbered. Predator Free Miramar officially launched on August 12<sup>th</sup>, and the initial response from residents has been huge.

The project is a volunteer community effort to rid the Peninsula of rats and mice, and bring back the birds and the bush to Wellington's eastern suburbs.

"Miramar is already possum-free, we know with energy from our community we can get it clear of rats and mustelids too" says Predator Free Miramar coordinator Dan Henry.

"We're creating a community of backyard trappers. We're providing free traps for householders, asking them to keep it baited in the backyard and report their catches".

The traps are housed in timber tunnels to keep pets and children safely away. The first shipment of traps was funded through Predator Free Wellington – a partnership between Wellington City Council, Greater Wellington Regional Council and the Next Foundation, but the group will be seeking sponsorship to complete the project.

The project aims to bring back the birds and the bush to the peninsula, and is part of the wider Predator Free New Zealand 2050 vision, launched by the government last year.

With almost 200 traps on the ground after four weeks, backyard trappers have taken out a hundred rats and mice already. Predator Free Seatoun already has a solid trap network in place, and the two groups are working together with their common aim.

"Before they got rid of possums, there were no Tui on the Peninsula anywhere. Now, they're just part of the neighbourhood" says Dan "If we work together on this we can have kereru, kaka and maybe even kiwi here one day."


